WORKING TOGETHER WITH GREATER IMPACT



We partner with other experienced, passionate and specialist groups in joint projects that acknowledge cultural diversity, enhance lives and strengthen communities.

WORKING WITH OTHERS

- + Shine with Family Works a formal partnership which provides a full service to victims of family violence. Shine provides crisis intervention, while Family Works follows up with counselling and social work support. Family Works also supports Shine in the extension of their safe@home programme in Tauranga and South Auckland.
- + Plunket Family Works a collaborative practice model that delivers early-intervention support for vulnerable families in South and East Auckland. The partnership means Plunket nurses can focus on health care while the family worker addresses underlying social issues.
- + Mothers and Babies Unit Family Works and Plunket work together to support mothers and their babies in the Auckland Region Women's Corrections Facility at Wiri. The partnership helps women and babies in the prison's self-care units to bond well, enhances parenting skills and prepares mothers for reintegration into the community.
- + Family Works and IOSIS through the Family Centred Services Fund, IOSIS and Family Works employ a shared family worker based in a local school to provide support for families affected by family violence in South Auckland.
- + Waitakere Family Start a partnership with The Fono West Auckland to deliver an intensive home visiting service for at-risk babies and children in Waitakere.
- + Youth Workers in Secondary Schools (YWiSS) in conjunction with the Anglican Trust for Women and Children, Family Works provides nine mentors in seven secondary schools in South and West Auckland under contract to the Ministry of Social Development and in collaboration with the Ministry of Education.

WORKING WITH COMMUNITIES

- + Connecting the generations senior students from Saint Kentigern's College and St Cuthbert's College in Auckland regularly visit Enliven elderly or disabled clients to share company and conversation.
- + Family violence community presentation organised by Family Violence Response Coordinators in the Bay of Plenty. These presentations are designed to prevent family violence through networking and community action.
- Project Co-op twice yearly, youth from Presbyterian Church youth groups offer practical help to Presbyterian Support Northern clients. Their 'simple acts of kindness' include gardening, housework, cleaning or baking.
- + Love in a box each December, junior students at St Cuthbert's College, Auckland, choose gifts for families with children of a similar age (5-12 years). They pack them into Christmas boxes for distribution via Family Works to struggling families throughout the region.
- + Foodbank support Presbyterian churches and schools regularly donate food items or money to the Presbyterian Support Northern Foodbank, and send teams to stock shelves and pack emergency food parcels.
- + **Dee's group** a dedicated group of about 35 volunteers provide friendship and stimulating activities for older people in Mairangi Bay and Takapuna.
